### **Earliest records**

The pages of this document contain the sum total of my research to date concerning the family of George Henry BASS, one of my eight great-grandparents.

Genealogy charts have been included, where possible, to assist in keeping the various family relationships in relation one to another.

Although my great-grandfather's name on this branch is BASS, the earliest records found so far refer to the BROMWELL family which, with the assistance of the IGI, can be traced back to the early 1600s.

BASS is not an uncommon surname, and there are hundreds to be found in Northamptonshire alone. However, since later generations are known to have lived in Raunds, a village about 14 miles to the northeast of Northampton, a search was concentrated on records from there.

The earliest record found so far on this branch of the family is of a male BASS (no forename given) who was born about 1536 at Raunds. He (presumably) married, and three sons were born; Gilbert, Thomas and George. Each of these sons married, although the records do not give their wives' forenames, referring to them simply as 'Mrs Gilbert', 'Mrs Thomas', 'Mrs George'! Each of these three families produced children.

However, there are no records of any BASS baptisms at Raunds between 1700 and 1779, and no marriages before 1756. Consequently no connection has been proved between these early Basses and my own family, which appears at Raunds with the marriage of William BASS and Elizabeth BROWN in 1796.

### G8 and G7 – BASS and UNDERWOOD families

William BASS and Mary UNDERWOOD were two of my 5xgt-grandparents. They were married on 14 NOV 1764¹ at Woodford by Thrapston, a village about three miles north-west of Raunds. Unfortunately the marriage entry in the Bishop's Transcript is split across two pages, and the actual date in November is missing; the banns were called on 21st October, 28th October and 4th November. Fortunately the entry in the marriage register is clear enough, showing the marriage date as the 14th November.

The entry also shows that while Mary was from Woodford William was from Melchbourne, which is about five miles from Raunds but in precisely the opposite direction from Woodford. It is about three miles south of Hargrave, where he was baptised.

There is more than one possibility for William's birth, and without further information it is not possible to trace this line further back.

Mary UNDERWOOD, daughter of William and Susannah, was baptised on 27 FEB 1736 in the parish of Woodford by Thrapston.

#### Children

Son William was baptised on 24 MAR 1765 at Woodford<sup>2</sup>, but no further children have been found from this marriage. It is possible that William and Mary moved to Melchbourne, especially if William had a job there.

# G6 - BASS family

Elizabeth BROWN, the eldest daughter of Robert and Mary, married William BASS on 18 FEB 1796<sup>1</sup>. They were two of my 4xgt-grandparents.

Although I have not confirmed birth or baptism for either William or Elizabeth (but see the previous section), I have discovered nine children from this marriage<sup>2</sup>.

In 1841 William, a smith, and Elizabeth were living in Raunds<sup>3</sup> with three of their children: Robert, Thomas and Joseph. Hannah, their second daughter, had died at the age of 12; William, Elizabeth, John and George had already married and left home.

Robert, the third child, had married and become widowed (see later); his son George was also living in the house, as were Joseph's wife Jane with their daughter Hannah and baby son Robert.

Elizabeth (née BROWN) and William BASS are buried together in the churchyard at Raunds. The inscription on their gravestone reads 'In Affectionate Remembrance of Elizabeth Bass died 6<sup>th</sup> January 1843 aged 73 years and William husband of the above died 7<sup>th</sup> June 1849 aged 84 years also Thomas son of the above died 22<sup>nd</sup> February 1882 aged 69'. William was born, therefore, in about 1765, and Elizabeth about 1770.

The next baptism was that of Elizabeth, on 01 JUL 1798. She married George MOORE.

### Robert (1800 – 1884) <sup>5</sup>

Robert was baptised on  $23~JUN~1805^6$ , together with Hannah and John, although census records show that he had been born about five years earlier. He married twice, and was buried at Raunds on  $14~NOV~1884^7$ .

### Hannah (1803 – 1812)

Hannah was baptised along with two of her brothers on 23 JUN 1805<sup>8</sup>. She was buried, at the age of 12, on 19 MAY 1815<sup>9</sup>, which indicates that she had been born in about 1803.

### John (1805 - 1882)<sup>10</sup>

John BASS was baptised on 23 JUN 180511, and married Emma PENN on 21 MAY 1832.

### Samuel (1808 – 1879) <sup>1</sup>

Samuel was baptised on 03 NOV 1811<sup>2</sup>, the same day as George, but was born probably three years earlier<sup>3</sup>.

George (1810 – 1878)

After the baptisms of John, Robert and Hannah in 1805 there seems to have been a gap of some years before George was baptised on 03 NOV 1811<sup>4</sup>, having been born a year or so earlier<sup>5</sup>. George is another of my 3xgt-grandfathers and his story continues in the next section.

### Thomas (1813 – 1882) <sup>6</sup>

Thomas was baptised on 31 JAN 18137. He never married and died in 1882 aged 69.

# G5 - BASS family (1)

William, the eldest son of William and Elizabeth, was born in about 1797; he doesn't appear in the Raunds baptism register. The surrounding parishes have been searched, without success, and he may never have been baptised.

He has been found in four census entries (1841 - 1871) and all agree that he was born around 1796 - 97.

He married Anne TRASLER (born about 1796 in Harpole, about four miles west of Northampton<sup>1</sup>). A marriage between William BASS and Ann TRESSLER took place at Harpole on 05 JUN 1825<sup>2</sup>: with the agreement of the two names, the name of the bride's village and the date (their first child, Hannah, was baptised in July 1826) it is very likely that this is the correct marriage.

It seems that shortly after the marriage they moved to Raunds, William's home village; this is where Hannah was baptised.

They had, in all, five children; at the time their last child, George, was born (1838) the family lived in Bath Street in Northampton and William's occupation was shown as 'shoemaker'.

The 1841 census shows the family still living in Bath Street<sup>3</sup>. The three eldest daughters were 'shoe closers' while William was described as a 'cordwainer'. In the following census William and Anne, with all their five children, are shown still living at the same address<sup>4</sup>. All five, together with their father, were employed in the shoe trade; both Williams, father and son, were 'shoe makers' while the girls were all 'shoe closers'.

By 1861 William and Ann had moved to St George Street<sup>5</sup>; only Elizabeth (aged 26, and a shoe machine fitter) and George (23, a shoe checker) were living with them. Hannah, their eldest daughter, had married and she and her husband Thomas Robinson were living in the house in Bath Street. Ten years later on still and William and Anne had moved along the same road to number 26<sup>6</sup> where they were sharing the house with Thomas and Hannah. William died on 22 FEB 1874<sup>7</sup> of old age aged 78 and in 1881 Anne was living alone at the same address<sup>8</sup>. She died in the first few months of 1889<sup>9</sup> aged 92.

Hannah (1826 - ?)10

Hannah, the first child and eldest daughter, was baptised on  $07\ JUL\ 1826^{11}$  at Raunds.

William (1828 – 1888)<sup>12</sup>

William was born about 1828. He married late in life and died in 1888.

Mary  $(1830 - ?)^{1}$ 

Mary, the second daughter, was baptised in 1830. She married William Henry FOX.

Elizabeth  $(1835 - ?)^2$  028M

The remaining daughter of William and Anne, Elizabeth, was baptised about 1835. In 1862<sup>3</sup> she married Thomas Lovell MAJOR.

George (1838 – ?) 028

Finally, the second son George, baptised in 1838, was one of my eight great-grandfathers. At the age of 12 he was described as a 'shoe-closer'; ten years later he was a 'shoe checker' and still living with his parents, but in 1867 married his cousin Betsy BASS<sup>4</sup> (the daughter of George and Betsy née Bromwell).

# G5 - BASS family (2)

George BASS was the seventh child and fifth son of William and Elizabeth. He was born in about 1811.

On 19 FEB 1833 he married Betsy BROMWELL<sup>1</sup>, who had been born in about 1811 in Riseley, Bedfordshire. Riseley is about six miles SSE of Raunds.

Only two children have been found from this marriage, both born in Northampton: George, born 22 SEP 1838 and Betsy, my great-great-grandmother, born 12 JUL 1842. Not a great deal of imagination shown in christening the children!

At the time their daughter Betsy was born (1842) the family lived in Scarletwell Street<sup>2</sup>, possibly not far from George's brother John. The birth certificate shows not the signature of Betsy (the mother) but her mark.

A 'G. Bass, watchmaker' is shown as living in George Row, Northampton, in the Post Office Directory for 1847/8 although no trace can be found of him at that address in either the 1841 or 1851 census. Is this the same George or a red herring?

In the 1861 census the family (George and Betsy senior, plus children George and Betsy aged 22 and 18 respectively) were living in Market Square, Northampton<sup>3</sup>. Both father and son were watchmakers; the senior was a 'jobbing watchmaker', the junior a 'watchmaker optician'. Betsy (junior) was a dressmaker.

Ten years later, in 1871, George and Betsy senior were still at the same address; George is a 'watchmaker and builder'. Son George, by now aged 32 and a 'watchmaker and optician', as he had been ten years earlier, was still at home with his parents.

The Post Office Directory for 1877 shows 'George Bass & Son, Watchmakers' at 59 Sheep Street. George died in the following year, on 09 MAY 1878. Luckily, or fortuitously, he had made a will only three days earlier in which his abode was confirmed as 59 Sheep Street. They can only have been there a few years as the 1871 census shows 59 Sheep Street as 'building' (which I take to mean 'being built'). His estate was listed as less than £300 and extracts from the will are shown overleaf.

One of the witnesses to the will was William Henry FOX, his niece Mary's husband. As has already been mentioned (see Appendix 4B3), William and Mary were living at 36 Lower Mounts in both 1871 and 1881: he was a 'Solicitor's Managing Clerk'.

One of the beneficiaries named in the will is Eli WARREN. A Thomas WARREN married Eliza BROMWELL, from Riseley, in 1817 – it is likely that Eliza and Betsy were related.

George BASS the elder of 59 Sheep Street, watch and clock maker and builder...

- ... to my son George BASS the younger of 59 Sheep Street and Eli Warren of Clare Street Northampton, builder.
- ... to my wife Betsey BASS ...
- $\dots$  my daughter Betsey BASS wife of my nephew George BASS (son of my brother William BASS deceased)  $\dots$

George BASS the younger and Eli WARREN were named as trustees and executors.

The will was signed on 06 MAY 1878. Witnesses were: Wm Hy Fox, 36 Lower Mounts; Joseph Woods, 82 Horsemarket George BASS died on 09 MAY 1878 at 59 Sheep Street, Northampton. Estate under £ 300.

The will was proved at Northampton on 07 JUN 1878.

George's will is particularly valuable as it establishes that Betsy, his daughter, and George (his son-in-law and Betsy's husband) were indeed cousins.

Following her husband's death Betsy moved to live with her daughter and son-in-law, Betsy (junior) and George, in Abington Street<sup>1</sup> (see below). She died in 1890<sup>2</sup>, outliving her daughter (see below) and her death was registered in the first quarter of that year in Northampton.

### George (1838 – 1917)<sup>3</sup>

George was born on 22 SEP 1838, and he married Annie (1845 - ?). Probate was granted on 21 DEC 1917 so presumably he died earlier that year.

Betsy (1842 – 1886)

Betsy, one of my gt-gt-grandmothers, was born on 12 JUL 1842. She married her cousin George (the son of William and Anne) on 10 JUN 1867.

# A plethora of Georges

All these Georges and Williams make tracing the family line very confusing, particularly with the marriage of cousins. In an attempt to clarify the various relationships the diagram included may help.

# G4 - BASS family

At the date of their marriage, 10 JUN 1867<sup>1</sup>, George was living at 21 St George's Street (his parents were shown at 20 St George's Street in the 1861 census) and Betsy in Market Square, presumably at number 12 with her parents. They were married in the Castle Hill Chapel, an Independent church.

Four years after their wedding, the 1871 census shows George and Betsy living in Princess Street<sup>2</sup> with their son George Henry (born 02 MAR 1869<sup>3</sup>) and George's brother elder William who by this time was 43 and not yet married. George, who in 1861 was a 'shoe checker', was now a 'shoe manufacturer' and William a 'shoeman's assistant'. Later in that year, on 06 OCT 1871<sup>4</sup>, their first (and only) daughter Lilian was born.

The Post Office directory for 1877 shows a George Bass<sup>5</sup>, a shoe manufacturer, at 'Lower Mounts'. Is this anywhere near Princess Street? – perhaps this was a workshop? Princess Street, together with most of Newlands (see the STEVENS book) was demolished in 1972.

By 1890, however, there was no Bass shown in Lower Mounts although William FOX and his wife Mary (nee BASS) were still living there.

By 1881 George and Betsy had moved to Abington Street<sup>6</sup>. As well as George Henry and Lilian (clearly shown as 'Selina' in the census return), who by this time were 12 and 10 respectively, they a son shown only as 'F. E.' who was just 2 years old. They were also providing a home for Betsy senior, by now a widow. Ann (George's mother) too was by now a widow, her husband William having died in 1874.

Betsy died on 24 MAR 1886<sup>7</sup>, aged only 43, at home in Abington Street; the cause of death was shown as 'epilepsy, many years; palpitation and irregular action of heart, one year'. The Post Office Directory for 1890 shows a 'Geo Bass' living at 1 Kingsley Terrace, which probably refers to this George; the census for the following year shows him as a widower, living in Kingsley Gardens with the three children. By 1901 he was living in Kingsley Terrace: he was no longer working but 'living on [his] own means'.

Two years later, in 1903<sup>8</sup>, and aged 65, George married Margaret BASS. She was the widow of George's first cousin (another George), who had died on 02 OCT 1896<sup>9</sup> (see page 37 for further details). They lived in Raunds, in Margaret's home in Brook Street<sup>10</sup>, together with her niece Emily DISHER and a servant, Annie WARNER.

Margaret died on 07 OCT 1921, and was also buried in Raunds Methodist churchyard<sup>11</sup>; George died aged 85 in 1924<sup>12</sup>.

### George Henry (1869 – 1945)

014

George Henry Bass was my great-grandfather. On 07 JUN 1892 he married Caroline Ann STEVENS in the same Castle Hill Chapel<sup>1</sup> where his parents had been married 24 years earlier. The story is continued in a separate booklet ('Recent Generations').

Lilian (1871 – 1895) 014N

Lilian was born towards the end of 1871<sup>2</sup> and she died at the age of 23 in 1895<sup>3</sup>. George and Caroline's first child, my grandmother, who was born the same year, was named after her.

### Frank Edward $(1874 - ?)^4$

Frank Edward (the mysterious 'F. E.') was born towards the end of 1873<sup>5</sup>. He married twice.

# **G9 – BROWN family**

The IGI shows three possible entries for a William BROWN baptised at Raunds in the last quarter of the 17<sup>th</sup> century¹:

date	parents
25 JUN 1682	Thomas, Elizabeth
19 AUG 1691	Thomas, Elizabeth
09 JUN 1695	William, Elizabeth

If the parents were the same Thomas and Elizabeth in each of the first two cases then it is likely that the first William died, although the NBI records no burial of a William in Northamptonshire before 1713.

Without further information it is impossible to tell which (if any) of these three is my 6 x gt-grandfather William. However, he married in 1721 (see page 20) and the only other marriage of a William BROWN at Raunds was in 1749. Thus it is likely that my ancestor was one of the two Williams born towards the end of the 17<sup>th</sup> century.

A William was buried on 12 AUG 1716 at Raunds but the register gives no further details; it also records the burial of a 'William the elder' on 30 JUL 1733.

# **G8 – BROWN family**

William BROWN and Lucy GEARY, two of my 6xgt-grandparents, were married at Raunds on 12 JAN 1721/22<sup>1</sup>. Lucy had been baptised at Raunds, on Christmas Day 1701<sup>2</sup>, daughter of William GEARY and Elizabeth.

William and Lucy had eight children<sup>3</sup>, two of whom – both named Alice – died in infancy<sup>4</sup>. The baptism entry for the youngest son, Robert, records that his father William was a shepherd.

The burial register for Raunds records the burial of Lucy, widow of William, on 17 APR 1764<sup>5</sup>. The only entry for a William in the burial register between 1741 and 1764 is on 18 AUG 1756, recording the burial of 'William, son of John and Mary'; however, this appears to refer to a completely different family, in which a William was baptised on 25 MAY 1755. The NBI contains no records for any GEARY at Raunds.

Robert (1741 – ?) 226

William and Lucy's youngest child, Robert, was baptised on 22 NOV 1741<sup>6</sup>; he was my 5xgt-grandfather. The line continues in the next section.

#### Other children

There is no information about the other children of the family apart from the dates of baptism:

Elizabeth was baptised *03 MAR 1722/23* and married Thomas FLINTHAM on 01 NOV 1747 William was baptised *07 MAY 1725* and married Mary KNIGHTON on 25 MAR 1749 Susannah was baptised *27 AUG 1727*; she married John KIRKE on 13 FEB 1746/7 Anne was baptised *05 DEC 1731*; she married Henry FRYER, of Ringstead, on 04 APR 1752 Alice was baptised *26 MAY 1734* and buried *14 JUN 1735* John was baptised *16 MAY 1736* 

Alice was baptised 04 MAR 1738/9 and buried 05 JUN 1740.

# **G7 – BROWN family**

Robert, baptised at Raunds on 22 NOV 1741, was one of my 5xgt-grandfathers.

He married Mary, although the marriage appears not to have taken place at Raunds and Mary's surname is unknown. However, four children from the marriage were baptised there.

#### Elizabeth (1771 – ?)



# **G9 – GEARY family**

The IGI records the baptisms of five children born to William GEARY and Elizabeth TEER. Both William and Elizabeth had been born in Raunds<sup>1</sup>, but for some reason they were married at Higham Ferrers, a village about four miles to the south-west, on 11 MAR 1699<sup>2</sup>. Both Elizabeth and William were buried at Raunds<sup>3</sup>; Elizabeth on 09 MAR 1717 and William on 02 DEC 1740.



William was baptised at Raunds on 13 JUN 1700.

Their second child and first daughter, **Lucy**, was one of my 6xgt-grandmothers. She was baptised on 25 *DEC 1701*, at Raunds<sup>4</sup>. She married William BROWN in 1721 and her line continues on page 20.

Henry was baptised on 26 OCT 1703.

Thomas was baptised on 23 DEC 1705.

There are no GEARY burials recorded in the NBI for Northamptonshire before 1781.

# **G12 – BROMWELL family**

The origins of the Bromwell family have been traced back to the mid-16<sup>th</sup> century, although this has only been possible for two reasons: first, the family appears to have remained in one small village for two and a half centuries, and second, the records of baptism and marriage have been discovered through the IGI (and have not all yet been verified). All the records below are from Riseley, in Bedfordshire.

The earliest records found are the baptisms of John and his elder brother Josias, 'about' 1600 and 1599 respectively. Neither of their parents is named.

# **G11 – BROMWELL family**

All dates of burials at Riseley are taken from the NBI.

Josias married Margaret CROSSE on 02 DEC 1617; she had been born in about 1596 in Thurleigh, a small village about three miles south of Riseley. They had four children:

Thomas, baptised about 1618, died on 20 DEC 1630<sup>1</sup>;

Their second son, also **Thomas**, was baptised on 26 JAN 1623. His father is recorded as Josua but this is probably the same family, although there is no ready explanation why two children should both be named Thomas. A Thomas was buried at Riseley on 02 MAY 1699 and it is possible that this is the same Thomas; alternatively this could have been the burial of his cousin, John's son (see below);

Alice, the first daughter and third child, was baptised on 16 MAR 1628;

The last child, Amy, was baptised on 17 OCT 1630 and buried on 10 JAN 1654.

Josias died and was buried at Riseley on 20 APR 1631. A 'widow' BROMWELL was buried on 01 APR 1638 and this could well have been Margaret.

John BROMWELL married Katherine (surname unknown) on 29 SEP 1620. They were two of my 9xgt-grandparents and they had six children, all baptised at Riseley.

**William**, baptised 15 APR 1621, married Ann HATFIELD on 15 APR 1645 at Harrold; he was buried on 04 SEP 1658;

Mary was baptised on 19 SEP 1624;

Elizabeth, baptised on 02 MAR 1627, married Henry BENNIT [sic] on 31 OCT 1655 at Thurleigh;

Ann was baptised on 27 MAR 1631;

**John**, one of my 8xgt-grandparents, was baptised on 23 NOV 1634. He married Katherine SPERRY on 07 JUL 1667 and their line is followed on page 24;

Their youngest child, **Thomas**, was born in 1637, baptised on 11 FEB 1638, and married Martha SMITH on 08 JAN 1668. They had two children. The NBI records the burial of a Thomas at Riseley on 23 APR 1731 and it is possible this is the same Thomas (but see above).

Katherine died and was buried on 03 SEP 1656.

# G10 – BROMWELL family

John BROMWELL married Katherine SPERRY on 07 JUL 1667. She was the first of four children baptised by father John and mother Alice; the family is shown opposite.

John and Katherine had only two children that were baptised at Riseley. Katherine died and was buried at Riseley on 14 JUN 1697; John died in either 1702 or 1705<sup>1</sup>.

The younger child, Alice, was baptised on 16 SEP 1672; no record of her marriage or burial has been found.

William, baptised about 1668, married Frances PETTY on 06 FEB 1689 at Oakley; they were two of my 7xgt-grandparents and the line continues on page 24.

# **G9 – BROMWELL family**

William BROMWELL married Frances PETTY on 06 FEB 1689 at Oakley; they were two of my 7xgt-grandparents. Frances had been born in Riseley in about 1670: her mother was Dorothy, but her father's name is not recorded<sup>2</sup>.

Three of their children were baptised at Riseley.

**Thomas**, the eldest child, was baptised on 24 SEP 1693<sup>3</sup>;

William, my direct ancestor, was baptised on 08 MAR 1696 and married Elizabeth COWLEY on 02 SEP 1720. The line continues on page 24.

The youngest child found so far, Frances, was baptised on 19 MAY 1700. A Frances BROMWELL married Jn (John) NUEL on 22 OCT 1716; if this was 'our' Frances then perhaps she had not been baptised as an infant.

William died aged only 35 and was buried on 20 JUN 1703, a little more than a year after his father, and when his third child was only three years old. Frances survived him by almost a quarter of a century; she was buried on 07 JAN 1728.

# **G8 – BROMWELL family**

William BROMWELL married Elizabeth COWLEY on 02 OCT 1720. She had been born in about 1697 and baptised on 24 JUL 1698; her parents were William and Elizabeth. The Riseley register records just two children, and no others have been found within Bedfordshire.

William was baptised 12 JUL 1730.

John, baptised about 1733, was my direct ancestor. His story is continued on page 25. It is likely that Elizabeth died in 1761; the NBI records a burial at Riseley on 30 APR 1761. However, it is possible that this referred to another Elizabeth, the daughter of John BROMWELL, born only the previous year (although an infant death was often noted as such in the register); John was William's nephew, the son of his brother Thomas.

# **G7 – BROMWELL family**

John (1733-1774) and Sarah ROBINSON were married at Riseley on 11 OCT 1762: they were two of my 5xgt-grandparents. Sarah's parents were John ROBINSON and Mary ASPLAND. No record of their marriage has been found in the IGI; although there is a reference to the baptism of Edward APSLAND at Riseley on 07 MAY 1677, and the Riseley registers contain many references to this family.

John and Sarah had three children<sup>1</sup>. NBI records show the burial of a John BROMWELL at Riseley on 03 JAN 1774, but this cannot be attributed unequivocally to this John.

James, baptised about 1765, was my direct ancestor. He married Elizabeth MARSHALL in 1796 and died in 1822. Their story continues on page 25.

Sarah was baptised on 24 JUN 1770; Martha on 10 JAN 1773.

# **G6 – BROMWELL family**

James BROMWELL and Elizabeth MARSHALL were married on 18 JAN 1796 in Melchbourne<sup>2</sup>; this is the neighbouring village to the north, about three miles from Riseley, and is where Elizabeth had been born in about 1775. Her parents were Richard and Elizabeth; their marriage is not recorded in the IGI.

**Betsy**, one of my 4xgt-grandmothers, was baptised at Riseley on 21 NOV 1811<sup>3</sup>. The ancestral line continues on page 14.

The IGI shows three other children, siblings to Betsy:

John was baptised on 09 OCT 1796.

**Elizabeth** was baptised on 20 MAY 1798 and married Thomas WARREN on 25 DEC 1817, at Northampton St Sepulchre.

James was baptised on 16 FEB 1800.

It is likely that there were other children between James and Betsy, but none has been found in the Riseley register.

Elizabeth died and was buried, at Riseley, on 12 SEP 1820; James survived her by two years and was buried on 03 DEC 1822.

# **G6 – TRASLER family**

# **Appendix 0140 – Frank Edward BASS (1874 – 1943)**

Frank Edward (the mysterious 'F. E.' of the census return) was born towards the end of 1873¹. His first wife was Selina GREEN, daughter of Frederick Walter, a grocer, and Charlotte. She had been born on 23 NOV 1872, and baptised just before her 18th birthday on 07 NOV 1890². At the time of her baptism the family address was 'The Market Place'. She and Frank married in 1897³, and they lived in Northampton⁴ not far from his brother and sister-in-law, George and Caroline. However, after only a few years Selina died at the age of 29⁵ and on 22 OCT 1903, less than two years later Frank married again⁶, this time to Mary DUMAYNE. She was a year younger than Frank², the daughter of John and Sarah. This wedding took place at St Edmund, Northampton.

Frank and Mary lived at 59 Bostock Avenue in Northampton. They had one son, whose name at birth was registered as Frank Harold, but who appears in the 1911 census as Harold Frank.

Mary owned a car, and she was similar in temperament to Caroline, Frank's sister-in-law. The two ladies would go shopping together in Bedford, where apparently the shops were better than those in Northampton.

Frank died on 02 DEC 1943; his address at the time was 15 Park Avenue North, Northampton. He was  $70^8$ . Probate was granted to Barclays Bank Ltd. and his effects amounted to £24,171 11s 3d.

# Appendix 028J – Hannah BASS (1826 – 1901)

Hannah was the first child and eldest daughter of William BASS and Anne TRASLER. She was born in Harpole, the same village as her mother, and baptised on *07 JUL 1826*. She appears in the 1841 and 1851 census returns, living with her parents in Bath Street, Northampton.

In the will (below) of Hannah's brother William, dated 1888, she is one of the beneficiaries, and is named as Hannah REEVE. The ONS does not record the marriage of a Hannah BASS to anyone named REEVE between 1840 and 1890, which raises the possibility that Hannah's marriage to her Mr REEVE was a second marriage.

FindMyPast shows the marriage of a Hannah BASS in Q4/1859<sup>1</sup>, when Hannah would have been 33, to Thomas ROBINSON, although all the parish registers within the Northampton registration district have been searched and this marriage has not been found.

The 1861 census shows Thomas and Hannah ROBINSON, ages 37 and 35 respectively, living at 42 Bath Street, Northampton St Sepulchre. The following census return, that for 1871, records Thomas and Hannah living at 26 St George's Street and sharing the house with William and Ann, Hannah's parents, who were by now aged 74 and 75. Ten years later Thomas and Hannah were still at the same address. No children from the marriage have been found.

FreeBMD records the death of Thomas ROBINSON, at the age of 59, in 1881<sup>2</sup>.

One year later the marriage of Hannah ROBINSON and David REEVES was registered in Northampton<sup>3</sup>. David was some 13 years younger than Hannah, and the 1891 census shows him as employed by her. They were living at the same address, 26, in St George's Street. David died aged only 51 in 1895<sup>4</sup>.

Hannah's death was registered, in Northampton, in 1901<sup>5</sup>. She died in the workhouse.

# **Appendix 028K – William BASS (1828 – 1888)**

William was the second child and the eldest son of William and Anne, and was born about 1828. In 1851 he was a shoemaker<sup>1</sup> and living with his parents in Bath Street; ten years later the census records him living in Peckham (south London)<sup>2</sup> where he was a 'boot maker'. Presumably the move didn't give him the independence he was looking for, as by 1871 he was back in Northampton, now living with George and Betsy, his brother and sister-in-law, and their family<sup>3</sup>. He was still unmarried, at the age of 43.

The 1881 census records a William BASS and his wife Sarrath (presumably Sarah) living at High Street, Northampton Priory St Andrew<sup>4</sup>. There were no children.

He was then aged 54, and a 'marker (shoe)'. A few years later, on 17 MAR 1888, he made a will in which he mentions his wife Sarah and several of his siblings. The ONS records only one marriage of a William BASS to a Sarah between 1845 and 1881 in Northamptonshire; this was registered in Market Harborough district<sup>5</sup> in 1880 and was of a 'William Needham BASS'. No other occurrence of 'Needham' has been found. If this is not the right one then it is possible that William and Sarah were never legally married.

He died a couple of months later on 13 MAY 1888 leaving an estate of £943 19s 1d. The will gives his address as '92 Colwyn Road (late High Street)', and this was the address where Sarah was living in 1891<sup>6</sup>. The census return for that year shows her as 'living on own means', although she had taken in a lodger, so presumably William's money had lasted. The Post Office Directory for 1890 shows a William Bass at 92 Colwyn Road. As William's will does not mention any children, it is probable that the Directory simply wasn't kept up to date properly.

# Appendix 028L - Mary BASS (1830 - ?)

Mary, the second daughter of William and Ann, was born about 1830. The 1851 census return of that year shows Mary as unmarried and living with her parents in Bath Street, Northampton.

In 1857 she married William Henry FOX¹, probably the son of William FOX; William senior had been born in Bedford in 1803 and was shown in the 1851 census return at Bath Street² earning a living as a shoemaker. The 1861 census return shows William and Mary, with daughter Mary, at 32 Lower Mounts³, but in both the 1871⁴ and 1881⁵ census returns William Henry and Mary were living at 36 Lower Mounts, with William a 'solicitor's managing clerk'. They had at least four children: Mary M, Jane A, Elizabeth E and Gertrude (in the 1871 census return 'Elizabeth' appears as 'Esther').

They were still at the same address in 1891<sup>6</sup>; with them was a 'boarder', Henry FOX, who was 91. This was perhaps an uncle, although no relationship is given. Ten years further on, in 1901<sup>7</sup>, they had changed address, but only by about a quarter of a mile. On census night their youngest daughter Gertrude, still unmarried at the age of 32, was with them, as was their second daughter Jane EVERITT and her three daughters Dorothy, Eleanor and Florence.

William died aged 75 in 1905<sup>8</sup>, and some time after this Mary moved to live with her daughter Jane in Edmonton, where she appears in the 1911 census return<sup>9</sup> before dying in 1914<sup>10</sup> at the age of 73.

### Mary Morton (1858 – ?)

Mary was born in 1858<sup>11</sup>. In 1889<sup>12</sup> she married George SIMMONS, a coach builder. However, the 1891 census return, two years later, shows Mary and George living in Waterloo (a northern suburb of Liverpool)<sup>13</sup> with three children, the eldest aged 10. That this is the right family is confirmed by George being a coach builder, both George and Mary having been born in Northampton, and Mary's sister Gertrude FOX living with them. Mary's age is shown as 32, giving additional confirmation.

The address was the same ten years later, in 1901<sup>14</sup>; by this time another daughter, Gladys, had been born. The 1911 census return<sup>15</sup> shows the family still in the same house, but reveals that there were eleven rooms, showing that the family was very well-to-do. The form

shows that only two children had been born to the marriage – possibly George misunderstood, and entered the number of children still living at home.

No conclusive death has been found for Mary.

#### Jane Ann (1863 – ?)

028LB

Jane's birth was registered in Northampton in 1863<sup>1</sup>. She married Edward EVERITT in 1885<sup>2</sup>; they had at least three children. The family hasn't been found in the 1891 census but in 1901<sup>3</sup> Jane was staying or living with her parents in Pytchley Street. With her were the three children from her marriage: Dorothy (1887), Eleanor (1888) and Florence (1890). Gertrude, Jane's sister, was also in the house.

By 1911<sup>4</sup>, ten years later, Ann and Edward (plus the three daughters) were living in Upper Edmonton. Edward was a 'leather bag cutter', while Dorothy and Florence were both working in the printing industry where Florence was an 'acrograph artist'<sup>5</sup>. Jane's mother Mary, by this time a widow, was living with them.

### Elizabeth Esther (1866 – ?)

Elizabeth (shown as Esther in the 1871 census return) was registered as 'Eliza' on her birth in 1866. She married Franklin Hyde CARTER in 1889. He was a commercial traveller, from Bristol. By 1891 they were living in Abington Avenue with a one-year-old daughter Gwendoline; Franklin was a 'commercial traveller'.

Ten years later they were at the same address<sup>9</sup>, and son Franklin (1892) and daughter Georgiana (1893) had been added to the family. Franklin (father) was a 'traveller' in the leather trade. By 1911 they had moved to Bailiff Street and Franklin was a shopkeeper. The three children were still living at home.

Franklin died in 1930, aged 70<sup>10</sup>; no conclusive death for Elizabeth has been found.

#### Gertrude (1868 – ?)

028LD

Gertrude was born in 1868<sup>11</sup>. She has been traced in each census return.

In 1871<sup>12</sup> and 1881<sup>13</sup>, aged 2 and 12 respectively, she was living with her parents. By 1891<sup>14</sup> she was either living with or staying with her sister Mary and her family in Waterloo, near Liverpool, but ten years later she had returned to Northampton to live once again with her parents, who were also providing a home for sister Jane and her three children.

#### Appendix 028L – Mary BASS

The 1911 census return contains an entry for Gertrude FOX, aged 42, single, a housekeeper, born in Northamptonshire<sup>1</sup>. This probably is 'my' Gertrude, as there is no other likely entry, but she was living at West Kirby, in Cheshire. If this is indeed the right Gertrude then perhaps she found employment through a contact of Mary and her husband George; somewhat strangely the census form (Gertrude is the sole entry at the address) is annotated 'British subject by parentage'.

No marriage has been found, neither has a conclusive death been established.

# **Appendix 029M – George BASS (1838 – 1917)**

George was born on 22 SEP 1838<sup>1</sup>, the first child of George BASS and Betsy (nee BROMWELL). In 1871, aged 32, he was a 'watchmaker and optician', and living with his parents at 12 Market Square<sup>2</sup>. Five years later, at the age of 38<sup>3</sup>, he married Annie DARLOW. She had been born in London, about 1844; there are two possibilities for her birth<sup>4</sup>.

In the 1881 census return<sup>5</sup> they, together with their two children<sup>6</sup> (Thomas, 1879, and Annie, 1881), were living in the house at 59 Sheep Street formerly occupied by his father George who had died three years earlier. George was by now described as a 'watch and clock maker'. The family remained at this address until at least 1901<sup>7</sup>; the census of this year shows son George as a 'plumber's apprentice' (he also appears, as a scholar, in the 1891 census return<sup>8</sup>).

The census return for 19119 shows that they had moved to Langham Place; just George and Annie, together with son George, were living there although they were now employing a servant.

Langham Place was the address at which George died on 06 SEP 1917, aged 78<sup>10</sup>. The death certificate shows his profession as 'retired watchmaker and jeweller (master)', and the cause of death as 'senile decay'; the death was registered by son Thomas, of 26 Colwyn Road.

His will, signed on 06 OCT 1914, lists no fewer than 28 houses! Extracts are shown. Probate was granted on 21 DEC 1917.

- ... my wife Annie BASS ... my sons Thomas BASS and George BASS...
- ... my three houses in Kingsley Road, my five houses in Kingsley Gardens, my house in Langham Place ...

- ... my six houses in Letts Road Far Catton, my two houses in St George's Place, my two houses in Sheep Street with the shops and warehouses adjoining or near thereto and my houses in Semilong Road . . .
- ... my daughter Annie Tompkins ...

#### Signed 06 OCT 1914; a codicil written 23 DEC 1914 mentions

. . . George and Annie as tenants-in-common . . . . {the house at} 26 Colwyn Road (occupied by Thomas) . . . {the house at} 93 Colwyn Road (occupied by John T. Farrell) . . .

The will indicates that their daughter Annie later became Mrs Tompkins: in fact she married Edgar TOMPKINS<sup>1</sup> in 1900, when she was only 19.

Annie (George's widow) died aged 85 in 1930<sup>2</sup>.

Thomas, the first son, married Florence in 1902<sup>3</sup>. By 1911 they were living at 26 Colwyn Road (this was one of the houses referred to in George's will). They had one son, who was aged 7, and living with them was a spinster aunt of Florence's. A likely death for Thomas was in 1930, at the early age of 51<sup>4</sup>.

The second child, **Annie**, married Edgar TOMPKINS in 1900 and by the time of the census the following year they were living in Kingsthorpe<sup>5</sup>, a suburb of Northampton. Edgar, about five years older than Annie, was a baker and came from Finedon. They had no children, but did have a female servant – shown as a journeyman baker! From the 1911 census<sup>6</sup> we learn that Edgar had a second name, Oscar. By this time they had three daughters and one son – and again one servant, this time male, again a journeyman baker. On 02 FEB 1915 Edgar enlisted in the Army at Aldershot, to serve 'for the duration'; the address he gave was High Street, Broughton. The enlistment from shows that he was not willing to be vaccinated. He joined the Army Service Corps and was posted to Salonica on 28 DEC 1915, but returned on 20 OCT 1916 when he was discharged as being 'no longer physically fit for war service'; the address then given was 8 Burns Street, Northampton

**George** became a plumber's apprentice and later a plumber; he was still living with his parents in 1911.

# **Appendix 056N – Elizabeth BASS (1798 – c1864)**

Elizabeth was baptised on 01 JUL 1798 and the two census returns in which she is listed confirms this as her YoB. On 08 NOV 1824 she married George MOORE, a shepherd, at Raunds¹; he seems to have worked at Elton, in Huntingdonshire, although the 1841 census return states that he was not a native of that county. This village is only just across the Northamptonshire border and is about 16 miles north-east of Raunds.

They appear to have lived in Elton following their marriage and had, in all, just three children<sup>2</sup>. The 1841 census return<sup>3</sup> shows the family at an address in Town Street, Elton; George was an 'ag lab'. Sharing the house with them were another 'ag lab' and an iron moulder.

George died in 1847<sup>4</sup>; the 1851 census return shows Elizabeth as a widow<sup>5</sup> and the 'occupation' column records her as a 'shepherd's widow'. In the census taken ten years later Elizabeth was a schoolmistress<sup>6</sup>; with her were the two younger children, George (aged 26 and a shepherd) and Mary (23, a teacher). Elizabeth died in either 1863 or 1865<sup>7</sup>.

# Appendix 0560 - Robert BASS (1800 - 1884)

Robert, the third child and second son of William and Elizabeth, was baptised at Raunds on 23 *JUN 1805*, along with John and Hannah. From the various census returns in which he appears he had been born in about 1800.

He married Sarah COLES on Christmas Day 1833. They had one son, George, who was baptised on 06 JUL 1834<sup>1</sup>.

Sarah died aged only 27 and was buried on 21 JUL 1835, just eighteen months after her marriage. Some eight years later, on 07 MAY 1843<sup>2</sup>, Robert married again, to Mary STEVENS, who came from Rushden and was about six years younger than Robert.

The 1851 census return shows them living in Marchants Lane, Raunds<sup>3</sup>, with three children of their own<sup>4</sup>, as well as George, Robert's son from his first marriage. Thomas, Robert's younger brother, was living with them and was a watchmaker; they were also providing a home for a younger Robert, the son of Joseph and Jane (Joseph was the youngest son of William and Elizabeth, and brother to both Robert and Thomas).

In 1861 they were living in Raunds<sup>5</sup> (the census return gives no further address) with children George, Sarah and Joseph. The whole family, apart from Mary, worked in the shoe trade. Thomas BASS, aged 48, was still lodging with them. Their immediate neighbours were Jane, the widow of Robert's younger brother Joseph, and five of her six children.

The 1871 census shows Robert still living in Raunds<sup>6</sup>, in Brook Street, with wife Mary and brother Thomas. Jane was still living next door.

In 1881 Robert and Mary were living at the same address<sup>7</sup> as ten years earlier, still with Thomas, and perhaps not far from Robert's son George by his first marriage. Thomas was still a watchmaker, although he is described as 'lodger' and not 'brother'. Mary was here shown as having been born in Raunds, although the 1851 and 1861 censuses showed her birthplace as Rushden.

Robert died in 1884 at the age of 848, confirming his year of birth as 1800. The churchyard at Raunds contains a gravestone bearing the inscription 'In Affectionate Remembrance of ROBERT BASS died 12 NOV 1884 aged 84'.

His widow Mary lived a further 14 years and moved in with her daughter Sarah and her husband Harris (see below) to live at Bythorn, Huntingdonshire<sup>9</sup>; Mary died in 1898<sup>10</sup>. Bythorn, now in Cambridgeshire, is about six miles north-east of Raunds.

### George (1834 – 1896)

0560A

George, baptised on 06 JUL 1834, later became a grocer and draper, and on 06 SEP 1870<sup>11</sup> married Margaret SMITH, herself a draper and daughter of John Smith, a lace dealer. She

had been born on 21 APR 1835<sup>1</sup>. In 1871 they were living in Brook Street, Raunds<sup>2</sup>. They appear to have had no children. George died on 02 OCT 1896 and was buried in Raunds churchyard<sup>3</sup>; in 1903 Margaret married a first cousin of her late husband (another George, my 2xgt-grandfather – see page 17). She survived her first husband by some 25 years, dying on 07 OCT 1921, and was also buried in Raunds Methodist churchyard<sup>4</sup>.

### Sarah (1843 – 1900)

056OB

Sarah was born towards the end of 1843<sup>5</sup>. On 27 NOV 1865<sup>6</sup>, at the age of 23, she married Harris NUNLEY at Raunds; Joseph and George BASS, presumably her brother and stepbrother, were the witnesses.

Harris was a shoemaker and had been previously married. His father William, who had been a labourer, had died before 18517: in that year his family were living in Thorp End, Raunds, with mother Sarah and children Sarah Ann (1836), Eunice (1838), William (1840) and Harris (1841). The two daughters were employed as 'horse hair tyers' [sic] while Sarah was a charwoman. Their father had possibly been a brother of Joseph NUNLEY, whose daughter Sarah married Sarah Bass's cousin John).

At about the same time one of Sarah's first cousins, another Sarah BASS, married Thomas HALL.

The 1861 census return shows Sarah, aged 17 and a 'shoe binder', living in Raunds with her parents Robert and Mary.

Sarah and Harris had at least six children. By the time the 1871 census return was taken<sup>8</sup> they had been married a little over five years and had two children - Robert, aged 4, and Sarah aged 8 months. Harris was a 'shoemaker' while Sarah was a 'cloth boot closer'. In 18819 they were still living in Raunds with the five eldest children. Harris and Robert William, the elder son, were 'shoe riveters'.

Ten years later, in 1891<sup>10</sup>, the family had moved to Huntingdon, to the village of Bythorn. Annie and Mary, the two youngest children, were still with their parents who were also providing a home for Comfort GROSS, shown as an aunt of Harris's, and Mary BASS, Sarah's widowed mother. Harris was by now a 'grocer and newsagent'.

Sarah died in 1900 at the age of 56<sup>11</sup>; Harris remained in Bythorn and the 1901 census shows him living with daughter Annie next door to Sarah's brother Joseph and his second wife (see next page). He later moved to Wiltshire and survived Sarah by 16 years, dying at the age of 75 in 1916<sup>12</sup>. His death was registered in Chippenham.

### Robert Stevens (1845 – 1852)

056OC

Robert and Mary's first son, Robert, was born in 1845<sup>1</sup> and died in 1852<sup>2</sup>.

## Joseph (1848 – 1912)

0560D

Joseph was the third child of Robert and Mary. He was born towards the beginning of 1848<sup>3</sup> although it seems that his birth was never registered. Towards the end of 1868<sup>4</sup> he married Tryphena CURTIS. She was about six years older than Joseph – her birth was registered in Northampton in 1842<sup>5</sup>, although the census returns in which she appears show her age based on a year of birth of about 1846 – and had been born in Chelveston, another small village just a couple of miles from Raunds.

For many years they lived in Blind Street, Stanwick<sup>6</sup>, the next village to Raunds and only about a mile away. In 1871 Joseph was a shoemaker, as he had been while living with his parents, but ten years later he was shown as a draper and grocer.

The 1891 census return<sup>7</sup> shows, surprisingly, that Joseph and Tryphena had moved to Layton with Warbreck. This is a township in Bispham parish, Lancashire, and it contains the town of Blackpool; it is some 170 miles from Stanwick. Joseph was a salesman and presumably some connection with his job had necessitated the move. None of the census entries show any children.

Tryphena died in 1895<sup>8</sup> at the age of 49, still in the Blackpool area. For some reason Joseph moved to Rugby during the next few years, where he married Alice HOLDING in 1899<sup>9</sup>. Two years later Joseph and Alice are recorded in the 1901<sup>10</sup> census return at Bythorn, in Huntingdonshire, where once again Joseph was a shoemaker – perhaps they returned to this area to be near his widowed brother-in-law Harris NUNLEY. Whether this was the reason or not, by 1911 he had returned to Raunds, where he and Alice were living in Wellington Road<sup>11</sup>.

Joseph died aged  $64^{12}$  in 1912. Rather strangely, his death was registered in Derby. However, Alice returned to Raunds, where she died in 1919 at the age of  $58^{13}$ .

# Appendix 056Q - John BASS (1805 - 1882)

John BASS, baptised on 23 *JUN 1805* along with Elizabeth, Robert and Hannah, was the fifth child and third son of William and Elizabeth. The various census returns indicate a year of birth of 1805 and this perhaps prompted the baptisms of the others!

He married Emma PENN at Northampton St Sepulchre on 21 MAY 1832. By 1841 they were living in Scarletwell Street, Northampton<sup>1</sup> and they were at the same address for the next three census dates<sup>2,3,4</sup>. They had three children, all boys<sup>5</sup>, although Samuel appears only in the 1841 census and died early in 1842<sup>6</sup>.

In each census the men were all shown as 'shoemakers' while Emma was a 'shoe binder'. Emma died towards the beginning of 1880<sup>7</sup> and the 1881 census shows John, a widower, in the Northampton workhouse<sup>8</sup>. He died early in the following year<sup>9</sup>.

John (1834 – 1911) 056QA

John was born in about 1834 (as shown in the various census returns). Towards the beginning of 1860<sup>10</sup> he married Mary Ann Walter HILL, who was also from Northampton; she was about eight years younger than he. They started their married life in Harding Terrace<sup>11</sup> but had moved to Laurence Street by 1871<sup>12</sup>, where they were living with three children and a servant. Their eldest child, Emma, was born in 1860 but died in 1864<sup>13</sup>. They had eight children in all.

Some time after 1871 they moved to Bailiff Street, where they remained for many years – they are recorded there in the 1881<sup>14</sup> and 1891<sup>15</sup> census returns. This is less than half a mile from Harding Terrace. Throughout all this time the male members of the family were all employed in the shoe trade, while Ellen and Amy were schoolteachers. By the time of the 1901 census<sup>16</sup> they had moved again, to Adams Avenue, further to the east.

John died in 1911<sup>17</sup> at the age of 77; Mary survived him for a further 11 years and died aged 80 in 1922.

A march was organised from Raunds to London in 1905, following much strike action because of dissatisfaction with wage levels. It started on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May with 115 marchers, an eleven-strong band and a cycle corps of three. Among the marchers was Frank BASS, the

youngest of John and Mary's children, and second cousin to my great-grandfather, George Henry. One of the cycle corps was a J. BASS, but no age is given; this could easily have been John, Frank's elder brother, but there are several other possibilities.

William [056QAB] was the second child, born on 20 APR 1864<sup>1</sup>. He lived with his parents, John and Mary Ann, at 52 Bailiff Street until his marriage, on 05 NOV 1893, to Elizabeth Constance DUDLEY at St Laurence, Northampton. Their first home was at 97 Oliver Street, Kingsthorpe<sup>2</sup>, about 1½ miles from Bailiff Street, from where their first child Constance Mary was baptised (at St Matthew) on 13 MAY 1894. For some reason they had moved two houses along the road, to 93, by the time Frank William was baptised on 16 OCT 1898. Sometime between the censuses of 1901<sup>3</sup> and 1911<sup>4</sup> the family moved to Norwich, to live at 21 Caernarvon Road. The 1939 Register then shows them at 165 Percy Road, Twickenham; by this time Frank had left home and was presumably in the Services. William died in October 1948.

**Frank [056QAH]** was the youngest child born to John and Mary Ann; he was baptised at St Sepulchre, Northampton, on 28 MAR 1880<sup>5</sup>, and the register records that he had been born in June the previous year. Father John was a 'machiner top closer'. Frank married Ethel Maud TEBBUTT at

William, the second child of John and Emma, was born in about 1838, although it seems that his birth was never officially registered<sup>6</sup>. He was still living with his parents in 1871, by which time he was 33, but the following year he married Mary Emma KNIGHTON on 29 AUG 1872<sup>7</sup>; she had been born towards the end of 1848<sup>8</sup>.

Mary died less than four years later on 13 JUN 1876<sup>9</sup> and was buried in Raunds churchyard; no children have been found.

William has not been found in the 1881 census; in 1891<sup>10</sup> he was a resident in the 'Rising Sun Lodging House', where he was shown as a 'newsagent'. He died later the same year<sup>11</sup> aged 53.

Samuel (1841-42) 056QC

Samuel, the third child of John and Emma, was born in early 1841 and died less than a year later<sup>12</sup>.

# Appendix 056R - Samuel BASS (1808 - 1879)

Samuel was baptised (at Raunds) on the same day, 03 NOV 1811<sup>1</sup>, as George, his younger brother, but he had been born three years earlier.

In 1832 he married Mary ODELL<sup>2</sup> in her village of Milton Ernest, Bedfordshire – this is about 13 miles south of Raunds – and they settled in the village. She had been baptised on either 20 MAY 1807 or 26 MAY 1807<sup>3</sup>, the daughter of James and Margaret.

In the 1841 census<sup>4</sup> Samuel was a blacksmith (perhaps *the* village blacksmith). With him and Mary were their four children<sup>5</sup>; all had been born in the village. They were living in the High Street.

The 1851 census<sup>6</sup> shows them at the same address. Mary and Susannah, the eldest child, were shown as lace makers, while George was a labourer. Sarah was staying with her aunt and uncle at Riseley<sup>7</sup>, five miles to the north. These were Edward MILLARD and Sarah (nee ODELL) who had been married in 1847 in Bedford<sup>8</sup>.

Ten years later, in 18619, the address was 'Flewton End'. With Samuel and Mary were Susannah (aged 27 and listed as an invalid) and Sarah (22, a lace maker).

A further ten years on the family were still in the same place<sup>10</sup>: Samuel, still a blacksmith, was described as '1 year paralitic' [sic], and Susannah was described as '18 years invalid'. A nine-year-old niece Caroline is listed. Her surname is hard to read and appears to be STENNOR, but as she was born in Milton Ernest she was probably from Mary's side of the family.

Samuel died towards the end of  $1879^{11}$ . Two years later Mary, by now living in No. 4 Almshouse in the village<sup>12</sup>, was still living with Susan(nah) who is shown as having a 'diseased spine – 27 years'. Also with them is Jesse BAY, described as 'grand-daughter' and aged 9. She had been born in Limehouse. Mary died very soon after the census had been taken in 1881 at the age of  $74^{13}$ .

### Susannah (1834 – 1902)

056RA

Susannah was the first child of Samuel and Mary. By the age of 17, in 1851<sup>14</sup>, she was a lacemaker living at home in Milton Ernest with her parents and siblings George and Hannah. She appears never to have moved away as each census return (for references see her parents, above) shows her living with them: by 1861 she was shown as an invalid and ten years later the census in 1871<sup>15</sup> records her as having been an invalid for 18 years – that is, since 1853, when she was 19. Whether this was caused by an accident or ill-health I am not likely to discover.

In 1881, by which time she was living with her widowed mother Mary in one of the village almshouses, she is recorded as having a 'diseased spine 27 years'. She was 47 by this time. Mary died shortly after the census was taken; perhaps Susannah was no longer entitled to live there, perhaps she chose to move – whatever the reason, by the time the census was taken in 1891¹ she was living alone but in Northampton. Ten years later² she was living with her younger sister Sarah and her husband. Only a year later, in 1902, she died at the age of 69³.

### George (1835 – 1911)

056RB

George was born in about 1835. By the age of 16 he was a labourer, and living with his parents in Milton Ernest.

In 1856<sup>4</sup> he married Emma LAMB, who was a couple of years older than he and from Souldrop, a delightfully-named village halfway between Milton Ernest and Rushden. They had only one child, George Thomas, born in 1860<sup>5</sup>. The census of the following year<sup>6</sup> shows the family living in Bedford, where George was a labourer.

Ten years later, in 1871<sup>7</sup>, he was employed as a 'striker in iron works'; the family had moved, but was still in Bedford. Many of his neighbours were also employed in the iron works. Later he became a 'blacksmith striker', although the 1881 census<sup>8</sup> does not state whether this was within the iron works. The family had moved less than a quarter of a mile, with George Thomas still at home; he was shown as a printer. By 1891<sup>9</sup> father George was a 'blacksmith's hammerman': their address had changed again, still within Bedford but a couple of miles to the southwest.

By 1901<sup>10</sup> both George and Emma were in their mid-60s. George had apparently retired as his occupation was shown as 'living on own means'; they had once again moved house but this time just along the road, from number 29 to number 77.

The census return for 1911<sup>11</sup> shows George living alone, as a widower; he had moved house to Russell Street. He died later the same year aged 76<sup>12</sup>. The only death of an Emma BASS registered within Bedfordshire between 1900 and 1930 is one that was registered in 1904<sup>13</sup>, but this gives Emma's age as 81, ten years too old. However, this is likely to be the correct one.

**George Thomas** became a printer. At the age of 20, in 1881<sup>14</sup>, he was still living with his parents but seven years later he married Mary HIBBERD in 1888<sup>15</sup>. They had at least two children. In 1891 he was a compositor and the family had moved to Stoke

Newington<sup>1</sup>; ten years later<sup>2</sup> he had become a printers' reader and they had moved just two doors along from their previous house. Staying (or living?) with the family was George RAY, another 'printer compositor', the son of George's aunt Hannah (see page 44).

The 1911 census return<sup>3</sup> shows George and Mary, with children Harold and Elsie, still at the same address; Harold had become an apprentice compositor.

### Sarah (1839 – 1904)

056RC

Sarah was the third child of Samuel and Mary; she had been born in 1839<sup>4</sup>. She is recorded in the 1851 census return<sup>5</sup> as living in the household of Edward and Sarah MILLARD, shown as 'niece'. If she was indeed a niece then Sarah MILLARD is likely to have been a sister of Mary, Sarah's mother. Ten years later, in 1861, she was back with her parents and elder sister Susannah in Milton Ernest. She was a lace-maker, as was her mother.

In 1863<sup>6</sup> she married Joseph WOODS. They appear to have had no children<sup>7</sup>, but entered into what seems to have been a successful business. In 1871<sup>8</sup> Sarah was a milliner, with Joseph a 'drill machinist'. Ten years later<sup>9</sup> they had moved to Northampton where he was a 'hatter and dyer'; Sarah was still a milliner but also part of the household was a servant, another milliner.

Perhaps the hat trade didn't work out as they intended, for by 1891 Joseph and Sarah were living in Blackpool<sup>10</sup> – within a couple of miles of Joseph BASS, Sarah's cousin (Joseph's father Robert was the elder brother of Samuel, Sarah's father – see page 38). Joseph (WOODS) was now a confectioner, Sarah had no occupation – but two servants, both confectioners, were living in the house. Her cousin Joseph was a salesman, so perhaps he was selling the confectionery that his cousin's family was making.

Tryphena, the wife of Sarah's cousin Joseph BASS, died in 1895 (see above), following which he married again, in Rugby. This may have prompted a move by Sarah and Joseph WOODS, for by 1901 they had moved back to Northampton<sup>11</sup>, to the very same house in which they had been living 20 years earlier. They were also providing a home for Susannah, Sarah's elder sister, who was an invalid.

Ten years later the 1911 census shows Joseph and Sarah, now aged 71 and 72, living in Greyfriars Street, Northampton<sup>12</sup>; the sheet states that one child, now dead, had been born to the marriage but the child has not been traced.

A possible death for Joseph was in 1914, at the age of  $74^{13}$ ; it is likely that Sarah died aged 87 in  $1927^{14}$ .

### Hannah Odell (1841 – 1914)

056RD

Hannah was Samuel and Mary's youngest child, born in Milton Ernest towards the end of 1840<sup>1</sup>. She was, presumably, given the second name Odell after her mother.

By the age of 20 she was working as a live-in servant for Elizabeth BASS in Bedford<sup>2</sup>. This Elizabeth hasn't been positively identified but as she had been born in Stilton, Huntingdonshire, in about 1785 she may not have been a relation. Earlier census returns show that she was a retired innkeeper; her husband William (who was roughly the same age as Elizabeth and who died in 1846<sup>3</sup>) was an 'ag lab'. In 1841 they had been living in Woodhurst, in Huntingdonshire.

In 1867 Hannah married Thomas RAY in Bedford<sup>4</sup>. He was a labourer, a couple of years older than Hannah, from the same village. By 1871<sup>5</sup> they had two children, Frederick (1868) and George (1870). Living in the same house were two of Thomas's brothers, William and George, who had both been born in Milton Ernest. Unaccountably, though, the family was living in Limehouse, part of Stepney; although ten years later<sup>6</sup> they were back in Bedford with an additional two children, Charles Thomas (1875) and Lizzie Mary (1879), where Thomas was a 'labourer in iron works'. Somewhat confusingly, Frederick and George were both born in Milton Ernest according to the 1871 census return, but in Limehouse according to the later. This latter version is probably correct.

The 1891 census return shows that the family had moved house, but a matter of only a few hundred yards. Son Thomas was a 'compositor's apprentice', while his younger brother George, himself a 'printer compositor', was living with his cousin<sup>7</sup> George Thomas BASS, another compositor (see page 42).

Ten years later, in 19018, Thomas (Hannah's husband) seems to have disappeared as the census return shows her as 'head', though still 'married'. No obvious death has been found for him, although a possibility was in 18999. By this time she had moved to Northampton, and was providing a home for Charles and (Elizabeth) Mary, as well as a couple from Stockport with a baby.

In 1903, at the age of 24, Mary married Fred GREEN<sup>10</sup> in Northampton, and by the time of the 1911 census<sup>11</sup> they were providing a home for Hannah, Mary's mother, who died just three years later aged 73<sup>12</sup>.

# Appendix 058N - Thomas BASS (1816 - 1882)

Thomas was baptised fifteen months after Samuel and George on 31 JAN 18131.

The 1841 census return<sup>2</sup> shows that he lived with his parents, William and Elizabeth, until he was at least 25.

He became a watchmaker and for most of his adult life – as shown by the census returns from 1851 to 1881<sup>3</sup> – he lodged with his brother Robert, and never married.

The only other mention of him is on the tombstone of his parents, William and Elizabeth, (see page 10) following his death in 1882 at age 69.

# Appendix 0580 - Joseph BASS (1815 - 1849)

The youngest child born to William and Elizabeth was Joseph, baptised on 19 NOV 1815 at Raunds<sup>1</sup>. He married Jane MANNING<sup>2</sup> on Christmas Day 1835<sup>3</sup>. Jane, the daughter of Sarah (née ROWE) and John MANNING, was born in Woodford, a village about four miles northeast of Raunds, in 1814. Jane was one of seven children, two of whom (Thomas and James) emigrated to the USA.

Joseph and Jane had five children before Joseph died towards the end of  $1849^4$  – and from the evidence of the 1861 census another daughter, Mary, was born in  $1854^5$ . All five children married.

In 1851 Jane, a widow, and four children were living in Marchants Lane, Raunds<sup>6</sup> close to Robert, Jane's brother-in-law (with whom Robert, her second child, was staying).

Ten years later the address in the 1861 census return<sup>7</sup> is given simply as 'Raunds'. Another daughter, Mary, had joined the family by this time (see below). In 1871 John and Mary were the only two children living at home, which was now in Brook Street<sup>8</sup>, next door to Robert BASS, the same brother-in-law.

In 1881 Jane, by now a widow of 32 years, was living with Mary and her husband Walter KNIGHT at Hill End, Raunds<sup>9</sup>. She later moved to live with her eldest daughter Hannah Elizabeth and her husband George and the 1891 census shows her living with Hannah at Bridge Street, Raunds<sup>10</sup>.

By 1901 the sisters Eliza, Emily, Mary and Amy (all daughters of Hannah) were living together at Manor Street, Raunds, and their grandmother Jane was living with them<sup>11</sup>. She died on 14 JUL 1910, aged 95, at Meadow View, Raunds, and was buried in Raunds Methodist churchyard<sup>12</sup>. The death was registered by Amy BEEBY, Hannah's youngest daughter.

### Hannah (1838 – 1919)

0580A

Hannah Elizabeth was born in  $1838^{13}$  and married George BEEBY, a shoemaker, on 11 AUG  $1862^{14}$ . He had been born in about 1832, the son of William BEEBY and Elizabeth PENTELOW, although he had not been baptised until  $17\ APR\ 1840$ . In 1851 he was living with his parents in Marchants Lane<sup>15</sup>; Hannah was living in the same road with her

widowed mother Jane and three younger siblings, and she was still living in her mother's house ten years later<sup>1</sup>, a year before her marriage.

By 1871<sup>2</sup> George and Hannah (Hannah E, according to the census) were living in Marshalls Lane and they were still there in 1881<sup>3</sup>. They had six children<sup>4</sup>.

George was a deacon at the Baptist Church for 19 years<sup>5</sup> and died<sup>6</sup> soon after the census was taken on 14 JUN 1881<sup>7</sup>. The 1891 census return shows Hannah as 'Anna' and her place of birth as Ringstead (the village just north of Raunds), but four of her daughters were still at home and she was also providing a home for her mother-in-law Jane BASS.

Hannah has not been found in either the 1901 or 1911 census returns, and no conclusive death has been discovered. The ONS reports no deaths of a Hannah BEEBY in Northamptonshire between 1891 and 1940, but one possibility is that of an Ann BEEBY in 19068. The death of a Hannah BEEBY aged 80 was registered at Wigton in 19199 but there is no obvious reason why she should have travelled so far (Wigton is in Cumbria, about ten miles south-west of Carlisle). Another possibility is that she remarried, but no marriage of a Hannah BEEBY in Northamptonshire has been found between 1885 and 1901.

### Robert (1841 – 1892)

0580B

Robert, the eldest son of Joseph and Jane, was born in MAR 1841 and in 1851 was staying (or living) with his uncle Robert in Marchants Lane<sup>10</sup>, Raunds.

Ten years later, in 1861<sup>11</sup>, he was boarding in New Town Road, in Northampton, with William and Mary MOORE – these were probably his aunt Elizabeth's brother-in-law and his wife. He married Zillah CLARK (born about 1841<sup>12</sup> in Raunds) towards the end of 1862<sup>13</sup>.

By the time of the next census, in 1871<sup>14</sup>, they were living in Vernon Street in Northampton where they remained for the rest of their lives. Robert was a shoemaker. Their only child Joseph was born in 1875<sup>15</sup> and he appears in the 1881 census return<sup>16</sup>.

By 1891<sup>17</sup> Joseph was an 'eyeletter', still living at home with his parents; the household also included a 7-year-old niece, Kate MARRIOTT. This could have been a niece from Zillah's side of the family; she had been born in Oxfordshire.

Robert died in 1892<sup>1</sup>; at the time of the next census, 1901, Zillah was living alone, still at the same address in Vernon Street<sup>2</sup>. She died in 1910<sup>3</sup> aged 68.

## William (1843 – 1907)

0580C

William, born about 1843<sup>4</sup>, lived with his parents in Raunds until at least 1861<sup>5</sup>; on the census return of that year he was a shoemaker. Ten years later, in 1871, he was described as a shoe finisher and lodging in Kettering<sup>6</sup> with Charles LILLEMAN, a shoe riveter, and his family.

For some reason he then travelled to Newcastle, where in 1878<sup>7</sup> he married Martha WILSON. She had been born in that city on 24 MAY 1856<sup>8,9</sup>. They had nine children<sup>10</sup> between 1879 and 1890: the first two were born in Newcastle before the family returned to Rushden<sup>11</sup>, where the remaining children were born at various addresses in Crabb Street.

The 1881 census return<sup>12</sup> shows the family (William, Martha, and the two eldest sons Thomas and John). Ten years later, at a different house in the same street<sup>13</sup>, they had been joined by a further six children.

The most likely death for Martha was in 1894 at the age of only 39<sup>14</sup>, although there is no obvious reason why the death should have been registered at Bedford. As Thomas, their eldest child, would have been only 15 she is unlikely to have been living with any of the children. Somewhat strangely William is shown as married rather than widowed in the 1901 census return<sup>15</sup>. He died in 1907<sup>16</sup>.

**Frederick**, their seventh child, was born in 1886<sup>17</sup>. He married Fanny UNDERWOOD in 1914<sup>18</sup>; the marriage was registered in Wellingborough, and they lived at 10 Pemberton Street, Rushden before he joined the 7388 7<sup>th</sup> Bn Northants Regiment. They had one daughter, Marjorie. Frederick died a sergeant on 25<sup>th</sup> March 1918 in the Somme: his death is commemorated on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website.

Arthur married Celia Ethel HOOTON.

Sarah (1846 – 1911)

058OD

Sarah, born towards the end of 1846<sup>1</sup>, married Thomas Ekins HALL on 30 NOV 1865<sup>2</sup>. Thomas had been born in 1840<sup>3</sup>, the son of James, a brazier; at the time of the marriage he was a shoemaker, while Sarah was a shoecloser.

The 1871 census shows Thomas and Sarah living in Raunds<sup>4</sup> with son Joseph, 4, and daughter Flora, 2. George HALL, probably a brother, was living next door with his family. Ten years later, in 1881<sup>5</sup>, the address was still the same but the family now comprised six children.

Thomas died in 1888<sup>6</sup> at the age of 47.

At the time of the next census, in 1891, Sarah and her youngest child, Annie, was visiting Joseph and Mary KNIGHTON<sup>7</sup> and their family in Colchester – both Joseph and Mary had been born in Raunds. Joseph was the younger brother of the Mary Emma KNIGHTON who married Sarah's cousin William; their father, Thomas, was a grocer & draper in Raunds. Whether this was a brief visit or a longer stay will probably never be known, but by 1901 Sarah was once again living in Raunds<sup>8</sup> with her two youngest daughters, Sarah and Annie; on this occasion Sarah declared her age as 59 (it should have been 55). A nine-year-old niece, Mary Jane BASS, was also living with them: she had been born in 1892<sup>9</sup> and was almost certainly the daughter of William and Martha. Her birth was registered in Wellingborough; her place of birth was given on the census return as Rushden, which is within the Wellingborough district.

The household was just the same ten years later, in 1911<sup>10</sup>, but they had moved to a different address in the village.

A likely death for Sarah is that registered in Wellingborough in 1911, when she was 6711.

John (1849 – 1916) 0580E

John was the youngest son of Joseph and Jane and was born about 1849. Like the rest of his family, he was a shoemaker and, until just before his marriage, he lived with his widowed mother Jane.

In 1872<sup>12</sup> he married Sarah Rhoda NUNLEY, probably a relative of the Harris Nunley who married John's cousin Sarah on 23 MAY 1872<sup>13</sup>. In 1851 Sarah (John's future wife) had been living at Thorp End, Raunds<sup>14</sup>, with her parents Joseph and Alice, a barber and shoe binder respectively. Also in the house with Sarah, aged three, were Alfred (1839), Mary Emma (1842), Owen (1844) and Joseph, aged nine months. At the time of her marriage Sarah was

employed as a machine minder, while John was a shoemaker; by this time Sarah's father Joseph was a coal merchant.

Until 1877 John had worked in the shoe trade, but after that date he kept a boot and shoe shop. By 1881 he and Sarah were living in Marshalls Lane, Raunds<sup>1</sup>; they had no children.

Ten years later, in 1891<sup>2</sup>, their address was 'Baker's Arms' in Raunds but no further clue is given. John was listed as a 'boot manufacturer', with Sarah shown as 'assistant'. Another assistant was John's niece, 19-year-old Kate BEEBY, one of the daughters of his sister Hannah.

By 1901<sup>3</sup> they were providing a home for two nieces: Kate BEEBY and Bertha HALL, both 28 years old. These were the daughters of John's sisters Hannah and Sarah respectively. John kept in touch with his uncles in America and transcripts of some of his letters are on file.

He died on 22 JAN 1916<sup>4</sup>. Probate was granted to Sarah, his widow, and John William NUNLEY, retired schoolmaster. Sarah lived a further twenty years and died on 03 DEC 1937. Both are buried in the Methodist churchyard at Raunds<sup>5</sup>.

#### *Mary (1853 – 1861)*

0580F

The youngest daughter was Mary. She was born on 15 SEP 1853<sup>6</sup>; that is, five years after Joseph's death. No father is shown on her birth certificate. Both the 1861 census<sup>7</sup> and the following one<sup>8</sup> show her living with Jane.

On 04 MAY 1879<sup>9</sup> she married Walter KNIGHT and the certificate shows her father as 'Joseph'; her age is given as 25, which confirms her year of birth. It is likely that Mary was indeed Jane's daughter (born to her at the age of 39) or she could possibly have been Hannah's daughter, born when Hannah was about 15; in either case she was illegitimate. Walter was two years younger than Mary and the son of Matthew, a shoemaker.

The 1881 census<sup>10</sup> shows Walter and Mary, together with Mary's mother (grandmother?) Jane living in Raunds. Only four years later Walter died, at the young age of 29<sup>11</sup>, and the 1891 census<sup>12</sup> shows the widowed Mary as housekeeper to James HARRIS, a widower with two young daughters. A Joseph MANNING, probably some relation of Mary's mother Jane, lived close by.

Six years later Mary and her erstwhile employer James were married<sup>13</sup>, although this second marriage for each of them lasted only a little over a year, as James died early in 1899<sup>14</sup>. The 1901 census shows Mary (by now Mary HARRIS, of course) living in Rotten Row with Amy and Kate – who are shown on the census return as 'daughters' but are really step-daughters,

being the daughters of James from his first marriage. Rotten Row was the road in which Mary's parents Joseph and Jane started their married life. Another family living in the same road at the same time was that of Alfred HALL (possibly relatives of Thomas HALL, the husband of Mary's sister Sarah). In the neighbouring house was the family of Ralph PENTELOW (the mother of George BEEBY, married to Mary's eldest sister Hannah, was born Elizabeth PENTELOW; it is likely that she was the sister of Ralph's great-grandfather James). A Walter BEEBY also lived along the road.

Mary died in 1915<sup>1</sup> aged 61.

# Appendix 432M – Thomas BROMWELL (1693 – ?)

Thomas, baptised on 24 SEP 1693 at Riseley, was the eldest child of William BROMWELL and Frances PETTY.

He married Elizabeth COOK on 10 OCT 1725 at Keysoe. They had four children:

Elizabeth was baptised on 12 MAR 1727.

**Frances**, perhaps named after Thomas's sister, was baptised on 14 APR 1728 and died the following year;

William was baptised on 25 JAN 1730 and died in 1786;

The fourth child, **John**, was baptised in about 1731. He married Elizabeth WHITE on 11 OCT 1756 and they had one daughter Elizabeth, baptised 13 JAN 1760.

It is likely that Thomas's wife Elizabeth then died, perhaps in childbirth, for there is another marriage recorded of Thomas to Ann WILLIAMSON on 10 APR 1732 at Milton Ernest. This marriage produced a further three children: Ann, baptised 13 APR 1735; Mary, baptised 16 FEB 1738; and Thomas, baptised 26 APR 1741.

### Other records

BASS is not an uncommon name and it should come as no surprise to discover that there are many records of the name that don't appear to fit into the family.

#### IGI

All the following instances are shown as occurring in Raunds.

The IGI shows an Elizabeth BASS, daughter of John and Elizabeth, baptised on 23 JUN 1805. This would give the possibility of a John BASS, brother of my 3xgt-grandfather William. There is an entry in the IGI for a Hannah Elizabeth, daughter of John, baptised in 1839. No John found yet fits although it is likely that this is an error and the father's name was Joseph, in which case this is the Hannah daughter of Jane (nee MANNING) and Joseph.

### Geographical connections

#### Northampton

Most of the city streets referred to in this book are close together in the centre of Northampton. Bath Street and Scarletwell Street are adjacent, to the west of Horsemarket; St George's Street is just to the north, with Sheep Street running south from one end; Lower Mounts is a continuation of St George's Street, with Abington Street (now part of the Grosvenor shopping centre) and Market Square running off it. Princess Street was demolished in 1972 (see page 17).

Colwyn Road is a little to the north-west of this group of streets.

#### Raunds

Marshalls Road, Brook Street and Hill Street, all in Raunds, meet at the Square; Marshalls Lane and Marchant Lane appear not to have survived to the present day. The recreation ground in Marshalls Road is along the road to the west, away from the village centre.

#### Other sources

'Raunds' (a book recording the history of the village) shows a photograph of 'Mr & Mrs John Bass in the garden of their newly-built house in Lawson Street. John Bass (1849-1916), bootmaker and retailer, owned a shop facing the Square, next to the chemist. At the rear of his property was a mixture of business premises and small dwellings known as Bass's Yard. In about 1896 John Bass's mother gave the land for the recreation ground in Marshalls Road.'

This is likely to have been John [058OE], the third son of Joseph and Jane; the dates of both birth and death correspond. The census return for 1901 shows their address as 'High Street', which forms part of the Square; he was a shoemaker. There is no Lawson Street in present-day Raunds.

It is also recorded in archives within Raunds Public Library that under a Bass charity dated 22 APR 1898 'land was conveyed to the Urban District Council by Margaret BASS to be used as a public recreation ground'.

This would seem to indicate that Margaret is the name of John's mother, assuming the two plots of land are the same, which seems likely. However, John's mother was Jane and it does appear that one account or the other is incorrect. Furthermore, since Jane's husband (Joseph BASS) died in 1849 she had been a pauper, later a charwoman, and from at least 1881had lived with one or other of her daughters. In 1895, aged 80, she was living with Hannah and her family and it seems unlikely that she would have been in a position to give land for use as a recreation ground.

#### Other records

It is more likely that the second account, that land was given by Margaret BASS, is correct, and that Margaret was the wife of George BASS [056OA] who had died on 02 OCT 1896 (see page 36 for further details). They had no children; George had been a grocer and draper and Margaret had been a draper and was the daughter of a lace dealer. Following her husband's death she may well have been in a position to have given some land to the Council. If this is so then the last sentence of the excerpt from the book *Raunds* is incorrect.

The same book relates 'an alarming incident' in 1904 concerning a house in **Hill Street**, occupied by Mr George Gaunt but owned by John BASS.
